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Marilyn Larson Fryer went to be with the Lord on March 9, 2021. She was 84 years old. She died after a long battle with Parkinson's Disease. She was an amazing wife, mother, grandmother, friend and educator.

Marilyn was born in Martinez, California on July 31, 1936, to Almir and Ida Larson. The family moved to Kingsburg, California where Almir was raised. Marilyn graduated from Kingsburg High School in 1954. She was a member of Quill and Scroll and a life member of the California Scholarship Federation. Marilyn graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree from San Jose State University. She received her Master of Arts degree from the University of San Francisco. Marilyn was a teacher in regular and special education. She taught for 39 years in several school districts and retired from Fresno Unified School District in 2000. She was the recipient of the outstanding Quality Educator Award from Paramount Unified School District and the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors in 1987. She was a member of Phi Delta Kappa and served as president in 1994-1995. Marilyn was an active member of St. Anthony of Padua until she became ill.

After her retirement, Marilyn enjoyed many hobbies. She loved reading, crossword puzzles, cooking, square dancing, weekly lunches with her Kingsburg High classmates, and daily visits to her 60+ internet chat room. She loved to travel and meet up with her chat room friends all over the United States. It was in that chat room that she met her beloved husband, Robert Fryer. They married on June 25, 2008. One of Marilyn's favorite hobbies was writing. She took writing classes and wrote many poems and short stories. She had a very creative mind.

Marilyn was preceded in death by her husband, Robert Fryer and her infant sons, Timothy and Paul Stauffer. She is survived by her children, Richard Benzler of Fresno and his daughter, Michaela, Kristen Rose of Madera and her husband Dan, and Thomas David

Benzler of Fresno and his wife, Celeste, and their children, Kyle, Kaleb, Sophia, and Thomas David II.

I was very blessed to become friends with Marilyn in the summer of 1990. Marilyn was a Special Education teacher at the time when she hired me to be one of her teacher assistants. We shared many funny, challenging and rewarding times working together side by side for 7 years. It was during this time with Marilyn, I was lucky to find a friendship both in her and her daughter Kris that would span the rest of our lifetimes.

Marilyn was a strong confident woman with a zest for life from the moment we first met. While working full time as a teacher, Marilyn attended classes at California State University Fresno because she had a Love of Learning: Mastering new skills, topics, and bodies of knowledge, and then sharing what she learned with those around her. She made the job fun by teaching her students the latest and greatest dances she learned; the chicken dance, the electric slide and others, enriching the classroom with music. Marilyn was able to look beyond a child's disability or label, and get to know them as a person.

My years working with Marilyn and the advice that she shared as one of my older female friends felt more valuable in a way, because it came from real-life experiences. My favorite saying from Marilyn was “Just because we are adults, doesn't mean that we have to discard playtime.”

Marilyn was not only a teacher to her students, but a teacher to all. If I was lucky enough to be paying attention to her soft-spoken wit, comments, sayings, and ideas, and catch that little smile/smirk that followed, was a sure sign there was a lesson in her spoken words she was meaning to convey.

Marilyn radiated confidence, the kind of confidence that makes you take healthy risks that enrich your life. Marilyn enjoyed her family, her many treasured friendships and her interactions she so endeared with her students.

The time I shared with Marilyn has truly made me a better person personally and professionally. I've become a strong outgoing advocate for people with disabilities, and grew to be both mentally and physically stronger as a woman which has transcended into my relationships with my own husband, kids and friendships.

I was blessed to be able to visit with Marilyn the summer of 2019 alongside her daughter Kris, and was able to thank her for all she contributed to my life. I'm so thankful for that wonderful opportunity and will cherish that moment forever.

Marilyn dear friend, you will be missed greatly. I know that your presence will always be with me. Thank you for being such an incredible role model.
